The plants listed below were cultivated by Marika Alvarado with assistance from Evie Carr for the exhibition *Will Wilson: AIR / Survey*. At the center of the exhibition is a new version of Wilson's *AIR Lab*, a hogan turned greenhouse containing local plant life and Medicines carefully chosen by Ms. Alvarado from her work as a Medicine Woman. Her wisdom and healing practice provides a local counterpoint to the ecological destruction highlighted in Wilson's photographs. Together, their collaboration speaks to the importance of cultural continuity, Indigenous wisdoms, and healing through the Earth.

### Night Blooming Tobacco

I use this plant for women's ceremonial baths. It is connected with the moon.




### Sinicuichi- Sun Opener

Use for calming the body, epilepsy, anxiety, and blood pressure.




## Honey Mesquite

Comes from a Nahuatl word: Mizquitl. It is antibacterial, antifungal, antidiabetic, and high protein.




## Ebano- Ebony

The seeds are edible, they can be ground into a flour and are high in protein.



Anachuaite- Mexican Olive Tree

The flower and seed pods are used for Bronchitis.



Muicle- Mexican Honeysuckle

Wonderful plant for Arthritis. It is a digestive, and the leaves and flowers make a tea.



# Sycamore

They are full of drinkable sap, and you can also make a syrup. The bark can be made into a coffee substitute. You can use the large trees to cook meats with because they release a sweetness.



#### Mexican Cinnamon

Ceylon, used as an antiinflammatory and for treating Diabetes and altitude illness.



## Vara Dulce- Kidneywood

Also know as Palo Azul. This plant is a strong diuretic. It can treat urinary infections, kidney inflammation, and fever.



#### Retama

The young branche's leaves are used for pain, urinary tract infections, and lowering blood sugar.



Chaparro Prieto- Texas Black Bush

This plant is used for weight loss.



Yerba de Buey- Texas Gum Weed

This plant is a sedative, antispasmodic, and expectorant. Good on poison ivy, asthma and bronchitis.




## Wild Mexican Oregano

This plant is used for dysentery, and is an intestinal antiseptic.



Sangre De Drago- Leather Stem

This plant is antimicrobial. It has been used for hair loss and dandruff.



# Guajillo

Also known as Catclaw mimosa. This plant is toxic.



Chapotillo- Texas Torch Wood

This is a bright burning wood.



Amargoso- Goat Bush

This plant is used to treat dysentery.



Manzanita- Uva-Ursi- Bearberry

This plant is an antiseptic and diuretic. It treats urinary tract issues and Poison Oak.



Cenizo- Texas Sage

This plant is used for sinus infections.



# Lacey Oak

This plant is edible.



## Cactus Root

These roots are a buffering agent.



# Nopales

This plant is used to treat diabetes.



### Cow's Ear

This plant is acidic, used for drawing out toxins.



## Agarita

This plant is anti-bacterial and contains an anti-viral compound called berberine. You can use the whole plant.



#### Mullein

The whole plant is medicine. It is used to treat bronchitis, colds, and tonsillitis.

Marika Alvarado is a Lipan Mescalero Apache Medicine Woman based in Central Texas. She is the founder of Of the Earth Institute of Indigenous Cultures and Teachings, and is a direct descendant of generations of Medicine Women: traditional native healers of spirit and body, midwives, and plant medicine practitioners. Her mother, grandmother, and aunt handed the medicine down to her. As a child, she was taught the traditional way, as her family tended those who came to them in need. She believes in teaching all people who have the dedication and spiritual will to use these teachings as Mother Earth and the generations before her intended.
